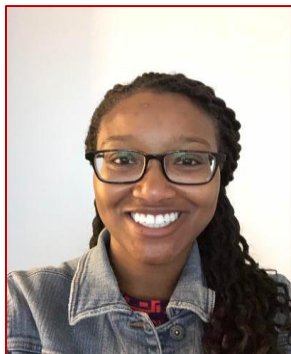

The Pennsylvania Black Conference on Higher Education is the brainchild of the late Honorable K. Leroy Irvis, but it is also part of his legacy. Our work is the result of seeds he planted but did not live to see the full impact of, but *our work* is also to plant seeds for future generations. Our actions now will determine whether, and to what extent, PBCOHE will exist in five, ten, and even twenty years. We get to choose what we want future PBCOHE to look like,

BUILDING BLACK NARRATIVES: NEWS ANCHOR/REPORTER CHERRI GREGG'S KEYNOTE ADDRESS ON THE IMPORTANCE OF SHAPING THE STORY AROUND THE 2020 RESPONSE TO THE MURDER OF GEORGE FLOYD AND BEYOND.



The PBCOHE 52nd annual conference's keynote speaker was WHYY afternoon drive host and news anchor Cherri Gregg. Ms. Gregg is uniquely qualified to address the conference's 'Race, Academics, Economics, Covid-19, and Health' (#REACH) theme. During the summer of 2020, many cities had citizens who were protesting the brutal police response against George Floyd which led to his death on May 25, 2020. Cherri was reporting from the streets during the unrest in Philadelphia. She brought her perspectives to the conference, discussing how the narrative around George Floyd evolved. The initial story- was an African American man tried to pass a counterfeit bill and has a medical emergency and died. But thanks to a brave teen who took out her phone to record the interaction, the world learned that Mr. Floyd was murdered by Minneapolis police. Millions of citizens, traumatized from seeing the murder on tape took to the streets demanding change. After covering the civil unrest, the impact of race during the pandemic and more, Cherri began

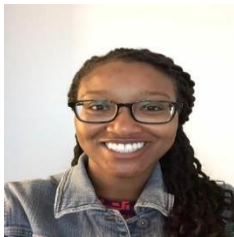
looking at how the stories of Black people are told and how the shape, tone and timing of the narrative impacts media perceptions. Cherri Gregg offered her talent during the PBCOHE 52nd annual conference with her keynote themed: Building Black Narratives: Owning Our Story So We Can Change the World.

SUPPORTING STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP

A central facet of the PBCOHE mission is supporting student learning. Given the costs associated with earning a degree, paying for college and purchasing supplies can put substantial demands upon the scarce resources that many students, and particularly minority students, are confronted with. Tuition, room and board, books, travel and other miscellaneous costs may burden student learning. In our effort to diminish such inconvenience and liberate the student's possibilities of learning, the PBCOHE offers financial assistance in scholarship awards. During the PBCOHE 52nd annual conference, the organization awarded 10 scholarships to support student learning. Seven deserving college and three deserving high school students were awarded \$1,000 each to help defray college learning costs. These students, we believe, will be tomorrow's intellectuals and leaders.

NAACP ACT-SO COMPETITIONS

The NAACP ACT-SO Competition is held each year and is chaired locally by Mr. Kaaba Brunson, PBCOHE NAACP ACT-SO and Education Policy Chair, along with his daughter and Co-Chair/Virtual Coordinator, Mrs. Damali Brunson-Murray and PBCOHE Central Region Member Rev. Dr. Nathaniel Gadsden of Life Esteem, Inc.

High school students across the country start a journey to sharpen their skills through the Afro-Academic, Cultural, Technological and Scientific Olympics (ACT-SO). From visual arts and business to performing and culinary arts, participants work with community-based volunteers for a year to develop projects and performances. The experience culminates in local and national events where students compete for scholarships and other rewards.

The Greater Harrisburg Area NAACP ACT-SO competition was held virtually on April 23rd with over twenty students from nine area high schools competing. The Award Ceremony was held May 7th at the Whitaker Center for Science and the Arts in Harrisburg. Gold medalists (those with scores between 95-100 in their category) were invited to compete at the national level.

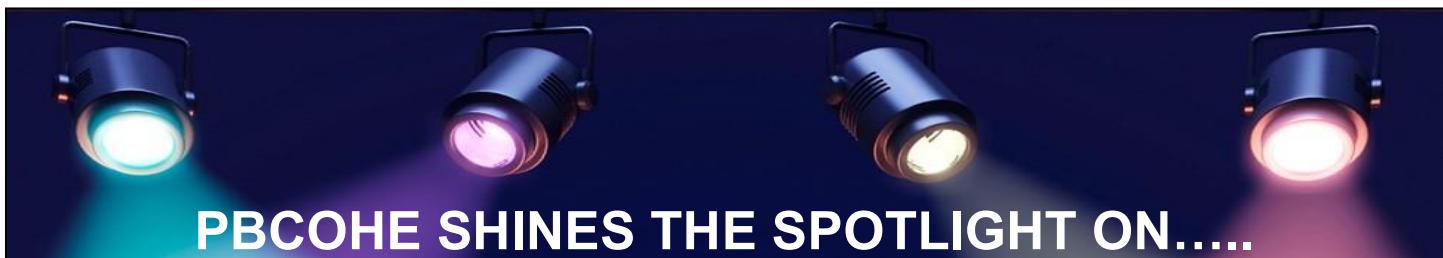

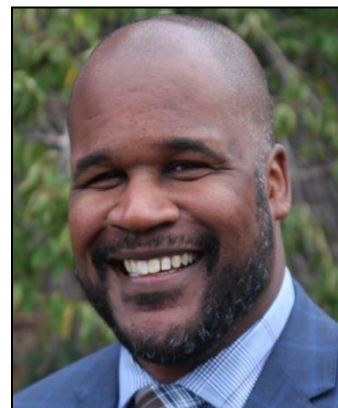

SLDI Co-Director

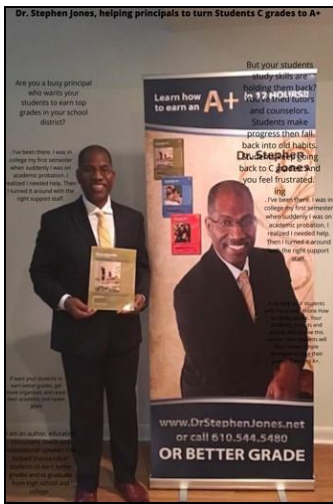
Mr. Albert Jones has been selected to serve as the inaugural Chief Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Officer (CDEIO) for Lock Haven, Bloomsburg and Mansfield universities.

In his new position, Mr. Jones provides vision, leadership and guidance on a full spectrum of DEI and social justice matters for all three universities and serve as a member of the presidents' cabinets. He also works closely with PASSHE Vice Chancellor and Chief Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Officer Dr. Denise Pearson to advance system-wide DEI efforts aimed at developing and implementing outcomes-based strategies.



Mr. Jones earned his undergraduate degree in Business Management from Lock Haven in 1999 and a master's degree in Organizational Management from the University of Phoenix in 2003. The campaign, in its fourth year, is held in celebration of National Nurses Week (May 6-12) to recognize the bravery, sacrifice, and dedication of nurses in the region.

Mrs. McCoy-Jones is a Wound and Education Specialist at the Corporal Michael Crescenz VA Medical Center in Philadelphia and is the VA’s leading subject matter expert for pressure injury prevention. She assisted in the development of a mobile app that provides veterans and caregivers timely pressure injury prevention information, management education, and resources, and is currently collaborating with skin/wound subject matter experts at the VA’s National Artificial Intelligence Institute and National Simulation program to develop education and training on topics related to addressing health disparities in assessing darker pigmented skin.

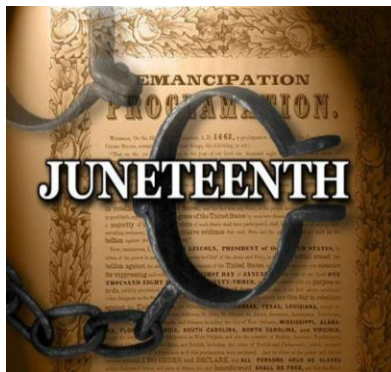
JUDGE KETANJI BROWN JACKSON CONFIRMED TO SERVE ON THE U.S. SUPREME COURT

On February 25, 2022 President Joe Biden nominated Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson to become the 116th Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, replacing Justice Stephen Breyer, who will be retiring at the end of the 2021-22 term.

On April 7, 2022 history was made when the Senate confirmed Judge Jackson's nomination, making her the first black woman Supreme Court Justice.



COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS AWARDED JOURNEYING TOWARD FREEDOM GRANT



In April 2022, the Voices Underground, a non-profit organization located in Kennett Square, in partnership with the PA Tourism Office, awarded the inaugural Journeying Toward Freedom grants to seven organizations to support Juneteenth celebrations being held this year across the state.

Juneteenth is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. It was on June 19, 1865 that the Union soldiers landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were now free - two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation which had become official January 1, 1863.

In 2019, Governor Tom Wolfe declared June 19 of each year as Juneteenth National Freedom Day in Pennsylvania. President Joe Biden signed the Juneteenth National Independence Day Act into law on June 17, 2021.

LINCOLN COLLEGE CLOSES ITS DOORS

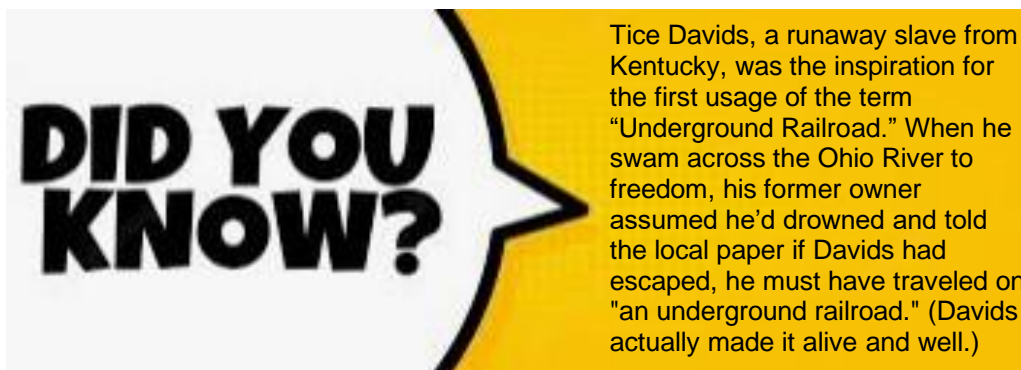
On May 13, 2022, Lincoln College, located in Lincoln, IL, closed its doors for good. The school was founded in 1865 by the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and named after President Abraham Lincoln. It would go on to become federally designated as a Predominantly Black Institution (PBI) by the United States Department of Education. The school suffered from a decline in enrollment due to the pandemic and struggled to bounce back after it became victim to a cyberattack in December 2021 that disabled their admissions systems for 3 months. Despite its best efforts, the school was unable to raise the \$50 million needed to keep the doors open.

INTEGRATED PA STATE SYSTEM SCHOOLS GET NEW NAMES

On July 1, 2022, Bloomsburg, Lock Haven, and Mansfield universities will become Commonwealth University of Pennsylvania. California, Clarion, and Edinboro universities will become Pennsylvania Western University (PennWest). The new universities will begin enrolling students in August 2022.

DID YOU KNOW THAT?

- Cathay Williams was the one and only female Buffalo Soldier, posing as a man named William Cathay to enlist in the 38th infantry in 1866. She served for two years before a doctor discovered that she was a woman, leading to her discharge.
- Both Condoleezza Rice and Martin Luther King, Jr. started college when they were just 15 years old. She studied political science at the University of Denver; he majored in sociology at Morehouse College in Atlanta.
- Black ingenuity helped devise creative — and effective — plans to escape enslavement. In 1848, husband-and-wife team William and Ellen Craft made it to the North, and eventually England, when she dressed as a white man and he posed as one of her slaves. A year later, Henry “Box” Brown literally mailed himself to freedom in a shipping box during a 27-hour trip from Richmond to Philadelphia.
- Liberia was founded and colonized by expatriates. The West African country is one of two sovereign states in the world started as a colony for ex-slaves and marginalized Black people. Sierra Leone is the other.
- Baseball legend Jackie Robinson had an older brother, Matthew Robinson, who was also a star athlete in his own right. He won a silver medal in the 200-yard dash in the 1936 Olympics — coming in second to Jesse Owens.
- Uncle Tom’s Cabin is a real place, so to speak. The home of Josiah Henson, whose life is generally believed to have been an inspiration for the novel, has been restored and added to the National Register of Historic Places in North Bethesda, Maryland.
- At age 42, Satchel Paige became the oldest rookie to play Major League Baseball and continued to play until he was 47.
- In 1967, Robert H. Lawrence, Jr. became the first African American to be trained as an astronaut. He unfortunately died in a plane crash during flight training before he could be sent on his first space mission. Sixteen years later, Guion “Guy” Bluford carried on Lawrence’s legacy by becoming the first Black man in space.
- Architect Paul Williams mastered the art of drawing upside down so that he could sit across from — not next to — white clients who didn’t want to sit side-by-side with a Black person.
- Athletes John Carlos and Tommie Smith made history — and headlines — when they raised their black-gloved fists on the awards stand at the 1968 Olympics. Both also wore Black socks and no shoes on the podium, representing Black poverty in America.

Dr. Elmer Haymon, Jr.

Dr. Elmer Haymon, Jr. began his career at CCAC in 2001 and served in several roles, including Senior Vice President for Student and Community Services and CEO of the Allegheny Campus. In 2008, he was appointed as President of Allegheny Campus and Homewood-Brushton Center. He also served on the Board of Directors for Three Rivers Adoption Council (TRAC) and was an active member of the Iota Phi Foundation in Pittsburgh (Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc.). He was a long-time supporter and member of PBCOHE for over thirty years. He and his sister, Dr. Francene Haymon Phillips, established the Esther-Jafari Haymon Scholarship in honor and memory of their mother, who supported PBCOHE in its early years and was the first Scholarship Committee chairperson.

Dr. Francene Haymon Phillips was a professor emeritus from Slippery Rock University of PA, retiring after 33 years of service. Dr. Haymon Phillips served the PBCOHE for over forty years where she served as President, Think Tank Chair, Business Liaison, Conference Chair, and sat on the Scholarship, IEML Steering, and Annual Conference Planning Committees. She was also a dedicated and active member of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. Past Pennsylvania Counseling Association (PCA) President Mark Kenney, remembered Dr. Haymon Phillips during the 2020 PCA Virtual Conference: "Francene, we will miss your caring nature, your visionary leadership and your desire to share your gifts and talents with your clients, your colleagues, your community and the counseling profession. We all will continue to strive to "value commitment" by acting on behalf of others who are in need of and benefit from our work as professional counselors."




Ms. Joanna Williams
